Patrick and Medard will serve as assistant pastors at St. Matthew's Parish and St. Francis de Sales Parish, respectively.









The ticket prices for this event have been kept to a minimum, as this is not a fundraising event. Tickets are available for purchase by scanning the QR Code.



First Homilies – New Deacons Preach at their first Masses

The Christian message [is] not only "informative" but "performative". That means: the Gospel is not merely a communication of things that can be known—it is one that makes things happen and is life-changing.

(Spe Salvi, 2)

The first homilies of newly ordained deacons are usually an occasion of both excitement and trepidation. Deacons Patrick and Medard rose to the occasion shortly after their diaconal ordination on December 9, 2022. Here are excerpts from their first homilies on the Third Sunday of Advent (*Gaudete* "Rejoice" Sunday):

Deacon Patrick at St. Matthew's Parish:

Our Lord posed this question to the crowds, "What did you come out into the wilderness to look at?" And I pose the same question to you today: What did you come to see? Why did you come to church? ... You came to see miracles and prophecy. Our hearts were made to see Christ, the Son of God, and to live. To have God enter into our lives, and to work wonders for us.

When I was in Grade 7, He showed Himself to me in the miracle I saw at Our Lady of Ta Pao ... I can tell you that He knows the depths of your heart even before you open your mouth to ask Him something. ... So, my siblings in Christ, let not your hearts grow old! Let us walk with hope.

Deacon Medard at Blessed Sacrament Parish:

Like John the Baptist in the Gospel today, who sent his disciples to check the identity of Jesus, we often do not know who Jesus Christ is. Jesus reveals who he is to John the Baptist. Jesus can heal our spiritual blindness, leprosy, and deafness. He has the power to give us a lively interior life. This is the identity of Jesus: Jesus is a saviour who comes to save and liberate us.

I met Jesus on a pilgrimage in Kibeho, where I first realized God was not indifferent to my life and suffering. ... If you have not yet had a personal encounter with Christ, ask him sincerely to manifest himself in your life so that you can experience his healing and transforming power.

Seminarians raised money for Catholic charities

On March 11, the seminarians at the Seminary of Christ the King (SCK) collaborated with those at St. Joseph Seminary in running the Ad Gentes ("to the nations") Fundraiser. It was a fantastic evening of trivia questions (and answer-stealing) and homemade churros. Their goal was to raise \$8000 for various Catholic charities, and they raised over \$14,000!

There were four teams competing. The more money a team raised, the more "lifelines" they received during the trivia (e.g. call a friend, Google search, etc.). Spirituality Year - apostolic experience




In February, the three seminarians at St. Joseph Seminary shared the following apostolic experiences:

Michael Roy at L'Arche in Calgary): "It was an experience that helped me grow in humility and step outside my comfort zone. Living alongside people with disabilities, I was struck by the fact that I never felt the need to act differently or impress them, something I often feel when meeting new people. The members of L'Arche accepted me as I was and were just happy with my presence in their community. I can say confidently that L'Arche was much more of a home than a job for me."

John Krump at L'Arche in Calgary: "My home had three assistants and four people with intellectual disabilities (or 'core members') all living together. Most of my time was spent just doing everyday things with the core members, like watching TV, colouring, going for walks, talking with them, or cooking together. It was amazing to be part of their lives for a month, sharing in these everyday moments and experiencing the joy they found in it all."

Luis Esquivel at the Marian Centre in Regina: "As a main apostolate, the Marian Center has a soup kitchen, where they provide 60-120 meals every day. I joined their way of life, washing dishes, serving meals, occasionally chopping vegetables, and praying with the community. I was very inspired by the community's faithfulness to prayer and commitment to working for others. It also led me to focus more on increasing my personal relationship with God."

formation with the Redemptoris Mater Seminary in Vancouver in 2014. In 2018, he returned home for some time of reflection and has now returned to the seminary, ready and motivated to pursue God's plan for his life.

Seminary 'Come and See'

Despite the snowstorm on February 25, five men made it through the weather and attended the Seminary Live-in at the Seminary of Christ the King. Some participants were able to stay for the night, while others attended for the day. St. Joseph Seminary hosted their annual Come and See, and this year 26 men from across Western Canada came to learn about seminary life. They met members of the community, prayed with the seminarians, and took another step in their discernment of the priesthood.

The Vocations Office is launching a new initiative to help discerners in their discernment journey. Our 'Parish Come and See' program will allow discerners to shadow a parish priest for a day, giving them a chance to witness what a day in the life of a priest would look like.
